

### A Brief History

The Desert Gardens Cumberland Presbyterian Church building, constructed in 1986 on prime desert land, is surrounded by Palo Verde and Mesquite trees, as well as fairy dusters, brittle bush, Saguaros, a variety of other cacti, and many other species of native plants. God's creatures are abundant, including coyotes and deer. Families of gambrel quail can often be seen, as can road runners, gila woodpeckers, cactus wrens, and yellow finches who feast on the seeds of the wild thistles which grow near the building.

On the north wall of the Sanctuary, a bank of large picture windows allows a most spectacular view of the Catalina Mountain range, making one ever mindful of the Psalmist's words, "I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills, from whence cometh my help. My help cometh from the Lord, which made heaven and earth." (Psalm 121: 1-2 KJV)

That is what we see today, but let us go back to the time before there was a building. The following summary of the church's beginning was found in a file in the church office:

"In August 1980, the then Western (now Cielo Grande) Presbytery initiated a Mission Probe in Tucson under the direction of Rev. John R. Ellis, Jr. recently retired Air Force chaplain. Tucson was the second of three cities to be selected by the presbytery as the site of a new church during the decade of the eighties. The Mission Probe continued under John's leadership into 1982.

An organizing pastor, the Rev. Don Sweet, was secured in September 1982. Don served the church until August 1987. During his tenure the church, supported by the presbytery, the Texas Synod, and the General Assembly board of Missions, was formally organized (May 6, 1984) and the first unit (the present structure) was dedicated in June 1986.

Present pastor, Joseph Snider, arrived in February 1988, after nearly 8 years as an employee of the General Assembly Board of Missions."

The author of the above is not identified, nor is there a date given, although it had to have been between February 1988, when Pastor Joseph Snider arrived and August 13, 1989, when "Presbytery del Cristo" was created.

Before there was a building, services were held first, in the Junior Achievement Building on Broadway and then in the Masonic Lodge on Pantano Road. Services were also held at least quarterly and often monthly in the outdoor Garden Chapel, the first area to be developed on the land. It is located on the east side of the property. Three tall crosses stand at the back of the garden and there is a lectern and several rows of benches - a beautiful setting for weddings and Easter sunrise services, as the first ray of light appears over the Rincon

Mountains. The chapel is always open. Anyone who feels the need may spend as much time as they would like in meditation or prayer. At the beginning of the path leading to the garden, there is a "registration" box in which visitors may leave prayer requests. These are added to the church's prayers which are lifted up to the Lord on Thursday evenings and Sunday mornings.

A "church" is not defined by its building or lack thereof, however. Nor is it defined by a beautiful garden setting. The "church" is the people - those who have committed their lives to Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior and who gather to worship and praise God for His wondrous redeeming love.

In 1984, fifty Charter Members, under the leadership of Pastor Don Sweet, formally founded Desert Gardens Church. Their signatures were written on a scroll which today hangs on the south wall of the sanctuary. They were as follows:

The Session minutes of June 28, 1984 state that, "After discussion on charter cut off date, motion was made and voted unanimous to cut off charter the 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday in July [July 8, 1984]." The minutes of the July 26, 1984 Session meeting state, "The charter was cut off and fifty names are on the charter."

Soon thereafter, committees were formed in preparation for construction of a building on the land. Work progressed on erecting the new church home: architectural drawings, excavation and land clearing, framing, painting, roofing, speaker systems, lights, kitchen installation, etc,

etc. Pastor Sweet called on many old friends from around the denomination to come to Tucson. Volunteer work crews responded from Illinois, Kentucky, and Texas. Friends and members of the congregation, not only helped build the structure, but also donated funds and furnishings, including two beautiful stained glass windows which grace the front of the sanctuary. Today, on either side of the framed signatures of the Charter Members on the south wall of the sanctuary, there are framed photographs and explanations of the symbolism in the stained glass windows (see the last two pages of this document). Turning Desert Gardens Church building from a dream into a reality truly was a community effort which culminated in a Service of Dedication on June 29, 1986.

Pastor Sweet's last contribution before submitting his resignation was to construct a "Garden of Remembrance" located on the west side of the building. The ashes of the following people have been scattered there: Bernadine Lopees (1925-1989), Rita Ann Scully (1942-1997), retired Air Force Chaplain, Colonel John R. Ellis, Jr. (1921-2004), and John Joseph Anderson (1935-2004).

To date, seven pastors have served the Desert Gardens' flock:

Rev. Don Sweet

Sept 1982 - Aug 1987

Highlights include the formal organization of the congregation, the construction of the building, and the construction of the Garden of Remembrance

Interim Pastor Emeritus, John Ellis, Jr.

Aug 1987 - Feb 1988

Rev. Joe Snider

Feb 1988 - Aug 1991

A scholar and a teacher. The building was expanded during his tenure to include the back porch and the extra classroom.

Rev. Scott Fowler

Sept 1992 - Nov 1996

The church experienced its strongest period of growth during Rev. Fowler's pastorate, by creating strong bonds with the home schooling community and attracting young families. He implemented a daily time of prayer at the church to start the day. He got the church involved in activities with other churches such as basketball and volleyball leagues. He expanded the youth programs.

Rev. John Marsh Rev. Michael McNeese Rev. Gerald Hagelin April 1997 - Oct 1998 Aug 2000 - Mar 2005 Aug 2007 - present

Various visiting ministers, some from other denominations, were engaged to preach the Gospel during those periods when Desert Gardens was without an ordained Cumberland pastor.

Today, although the congregation may be small in numbers, it is large in its spirit and love
