A. The Church and Community

The Palestine Cumberland Presbyterian Church was established in the late 1800's. The current site of the church was purchased in 1885. The people of the Methodist denomination joined with the Cumberland Presbyterians and shared the one church building. Palestine was a very rural community. The present church building was built in 1951. In 1973, a Fellowship Hall was added. In 1996, construction was begun on the Cumberland Presbyterian Activity Center, a 7500

square foot multi-purpose facility that includes a gymnasium, kitchen, storage rooms, and church schoolrooms. Currently, the church has no debt Our church facilities have been used for church activities, school groups, and other civic purposes. It would be a fair statement to say that our church is considered a leader in this community. We are often called upon to help with civic needs and Christian service needs in the community.

Although the Palestine area is largely agricultural, the majority of our membership is composed of professionals, educators, retirees, white-collar employees and business owners. Our membership could be described as a mix of religious backgrounds. We have members that have been lifelong Cumberland Presbyterians and members that are converts from other backgrounds.

The church owns a manse at 131 E. Wood Street in Palestine. It is approximately 1800 square feet We are considering expanding or replacing the manse. We have obtained plans for expansion from an architect and are currently waiting on bids. After bids are received, a decision will be made on the future of this project

Palestine is a small community of around 700. Palestine has its own school district It is located on Interstate 40 approximately half way between Little Rock and Memphis. The closest hospital is located in Forrest City, 8 miles east of Palestine. East Arkansas Community College is located in Forrest City also. There are several other churches in the community including Baptist, Church of Christ, Assembly of God, Methodist, to name a few. These churches are very cooperative. We have an ecumenical service every Fifth Sunday.

Palestine is located in Eastern Arkansas. This area is often referred to as the Mississippi Delta and is considered an economically depressed area of the state. There is a great deal of poverty in the area. Our church helps with the local food bank and soup kitchen. We are often called upon to address economic and physical needs in the community.

B. Program Areas in the Life of the Church

Our regular church services include Sunday School for all ages, Worship Service on Sunday, CPYF Program on Sunday Evenings that includes a meal and devotion for youth and adults followed by activities and classes for youth. We have an active CPWM that functions as an outreach ministry supporting such programs as the Hot Lunch Program in Colombia, visits to local nursing homes, and activities and meals for the residents of a local retirement home. In 1983, our choir gave its first Christmas Cantata. Since that time, we have continued to make this a tradition every year. Other churches are invited to participate and share in the Cantata each year.

Another tradition of our church is the Blessing of the Fields Service held each spring. Our church established this service in April 1989 to provide an outdoor setting for worship of God and to ask blessings on the crops planted in our largely agricultural community. Other churches have joined us in this tradition and take turns providing the setting and speaker each year.

We have church committees that meet monthly or as needed to plan and organize programs and activities. Our active committees are Christian Education, Worship, Building and Grounds, Mission, and Budget. These committees meet and make recommendations to the Session. Our Session is composed of rotating Elders, both male and female. It would be a fair assessment to say that our Session is strong and capable of meeting the physical needs of the church. We are seeking a pastor that is capable of leading the Session in meeting the spiritual needs of our congregation and providing a supportive and visible presence in the community.

C. Goals, Objectives, Viewpoints

In 2009, the Session composed a list of goals for the church based on needs and desires of the congregation. This list was prioritized and many of the goals have been achieved. Goals completed include retirement of church debt, remodeling of Fellowship Hall, and a new church sign.

D. Benevolence Support

In 2011, twelve percent of our total offerings were given to benevolent causes that included OUO, presbytery and synodical causes, local benevolence, World Vision, and other Second Mile programs. Some of the non-denominational causes we have supported in recent years include the St Francis County Food Pantry, 30 Hour Famine, Samaritans Purse, Fellowship of Christian Athletes, Relay for Life, Flood Relief support for the Palestine area, assisting transients with food and travel, and many individuals that needed financial help with family tragedies and illness. The Palestine Cumberland Presbyterian has a rich heritage in the denomination. We take great pride in calling ourselves Cumberland Presbyterian.
