In addition to her research, Natasha is an award-winning author and curriculum developer, focusing on Black Canadian experiences. Her publications include *Emancipation Day: Celebrating Freedom in Canada* (June 2010), *Talking about Freedom: Celebrating Freedom in Canada* (2012), multiple youth-focused titles, and several entries for the Canadian Encyclopedia on African Canadian history. Through her various professional, academic, and community roles, Natasha's work is grounded in her commitment to researching, collecting, preserving, and disseminating the histories Black Canadians.
