The unique set of sensory issues, social needs, and assistance was not being addressed by the teachers. There were daily calls that George had been sent to the principal's office due to an angry meltdown in the classroom. The parents were asked to take him home, or the school would have to consider his suspension because of continued misbehavior. For many children with special needs, the public school works well. However, in George's case, public school was not the answer.

His parents talked to the classroom teacher. She said, "I am not able to give him the time and help he needs. He needs to be more independent!" The special education teacher said, "George does not come to me when he is scheduled. He needs to be independent and come on his own." George was a second-grade child who needed to be included and guided. God's plan was for him to receive assistance in becoming who he was created to be. It was an extremely stressful time for his parents. They saw potential in their child. They reached out to the homeschool community and received the answer. Children with autism can thrive and learn life skills at home.

Does this sound familiar? Your child was not thriving in school and was in trouble every day. Your child did not get to move his/her clip to the top of the chart; it was always at the bottom. Children did not want to interact with your child. He/She was lonely, depressed, and labeled as the one who cried and was angry. Do not feel discouraged! Your child was uniquely created by God.

Therapies and doctor appointments may interrupt your schedule. Illness in the family happens, and holidays may disrupt the schedule. Parents of autistic children have learned that when the plan is not followed, especially during the holidays, negative behavior occurs sometimes. When this happens, get back on schedule as soon as possible so happiness in the home returns.

Happiness is a choice, a choice of the child and a choice of the parent. Happiness is seeing a beacon of hope. It is taking time to love, laugh, play, and comfort while remembering that your child ultimately

belongs to the Lord. He knows and cares for your child. Spend time with the Creator and allow Him to guide you in teaching your child.
