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
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Dear AME Church Family,

YOUNG ADULT CALL TO WORSHIP

Thrive: College & Young Adult Pastor

Leader: In a world filled with confusion, we come knowing that with You all things are possible.

Response: Lord, we need you!

Leader: In a world of social unrest, there are powers trying to eradicate the change paid for by the blood of our ancestors.

Response: Lord, just as our ancestors needed you then, we need you now!

Leader: As we step out to be change agents, we face eradication and hatred; Be a fence, lead, and guide us as we continue to fight for justice, peace, and equality.

Response: Lord, we need you now!

RAYAC HEART SONG (2023)

"Lift Him Up" (How To Reach The Masses)

In a world filled with streaming and social media, some churches are having difficulty connecting with those outside their church. A question constantly plaguing the church is "how do we get more young people in our church?" From Dress Down Sundays to Open Mic Nights, we try several different tactics to appeal to the highly stimulated, yet less tolerant heart and mind of young people.

But, the response to this nagging question sits right under our noses. We recite it often and pass it down to generations who follow. We place great energy in the words we say, yet somehow the connection is lost when we ask the question "what can we do?" But, journey with me through one of the great hymns of our church, and discover how Johnson Oatman Jr. penned the words that provide the instruction we seek.

Johnson Oatman Jr. grew up in the Methodist Episcopal Church, where he became a licensed and ordained minister at the age of 19. He grew up on the hymns of the church and took a special liking to them. After an illness forced him into retirement, he used his remaining years penning the words to over 7,000 hymns - one being "Lift Him Up" better known as "How To Reach The Masses"

In this energetic hymn of the church, Johnson not only provides us with an answer, he expounds on the needs of people, issues a warning, and ends with command - all of which gives voice to the thoughts and feelings of young people.

1 How to reach the masses, those of every birth, For an answer Jesus gave the key:
"And I, if I be lifted up from the earth,
Will draw all men unto Me."

Right from the beginning, the first verse gives us the solution we are seeking - Lift Him Up. Him being Jesus. We don't need lights and theatrics, world-renowned musicians and speakers (although they are very entertaining). Simply lift up Jesus, and He will draw all the world to Him.

2 Oh! the world is hungry for the Living Bread, Lift the Savior up for them to see; Trust Him, and do not doubt the words that He said, "I'll draw all men unto Me."

Johnson goes on to explain that the people are looking for food. We are hungry. The world (and the church) gives us so much junk food, but we need something sustainable that will satisfy the longing in our hearts and the aches in our spirit. We need the living bread - a word that is alive and speaks to the core of where we are in my life; encourages us to remember the ministry, works, and Faith of Jesus; and shows us Jesus is alive and a very present help. If the church would simply trust Jesus to do what He said He would, then we will confidently lift Him up.

3 Don't exalt the preacher, don't exalt the pew, Preach the Gospel simple, full and free; Prove Him and you will find that promise is true, "I'll draw all men unto Me."

The next two verses take somewhat of a shift and go from what to do to what not to do. It also takes a communal approach to reaching the masses. Church is not about the preacher, how well they whoop, if they hollered, or got Jesus up on the third day. Church is also not about the number of people sitting in the pew. Those things are minimal in the grand scheme of reaching young adults, who would rather receive a word that is clear, understandable, and applicable. We are not concerned with the number of bodies on the pews - only that those bodies welcome us to the pew. Again, expose the ways of Jesus to us, and He will do the rest.

4 Lift Him up by living as a Christian ought, Let the world in you the Savior see; Then men will gladly follow Him who once taught, "I'll draw all men unto Me."

In this final stanza, Johnson leaves the church with the command to live like Jesus - feeding the lamb, tending to the sheep, and feeding the sheep. Church goes beyond Sunday morning, and we are looking for you in our everyday lives. Do we see you only in church when we share a pew? Or, have you shown an interest outside those four walls? We want to see your sermon. We want to see your talk. We want to see Jesus in you, which will inspire us to follow you because we want to learn more about this man named Jesus.

The context of this hymn is what most, if not all, young adults are asking for. We want a church that Lifts Up Jesus - not just the healing, delivering, saving Jesus, but the water into wine, defiant, table-flipping Jesus. We are hungry for the LIVING bread - not the dead, stale bread that we've been eating for decades

because "this is the way we've always done it." We need the church to preach the gospel simple, full, and free and stop exalting the leaders and the number of bodies in the pews. Lift Jesus up by your living. Let us see how God has moved in your life. And, please stop acting like you haven't done anything or been through anything. Let us see how Jesus has worked on you because your testimony inspires and encourages our walk. Simply:

Lift Him up, (Lift the precious Savior up), Lift Him up, (Lift the precious Savior up), Still He speaks from eternity: "And I, if I be lifted up from the earth, Will draw all men unto Me."

This is our humble plea. This is our heart song!
