Imagine Your Story...

In St. Louis Public Schools, we provide all students access to high-quality literature that covers a wide range of topics. We use the “windows and mirrors” approach to literature exposure. This means that we want students to read books that reflect their own cultures, personalities, identities, etc. (mirrors) and we also want students to engage with titles that allow them a glimpse into the lives and experiences of others that may not reflect their own realities (windows).

We encourage students to engage in personal reading every day for pleasure. Reading for pleasure helps students maintain and improve academic skills learned during the school year. “Most kids know that summer reading provides benefits that extend well past the summer months. Seventy-seven percent agree that reading over the summer will help them during the school year and on average, kids read nine books in the summer of 2018.” Elementary students read more than nine books because the books are shorter in length. Secondary students tend to read fewer than nine books because the books are longer.

It is recommended that each student select titles from the lists provided for summer reading. Recommendations have been made by grade level based on the reading level and content of the text, but students may choose titles from any list if they desire. All of the titles contained in this Summer Reading List were recommended by SLPS teachers and staff and have also been endorsed by a number of

reputable literacy organizations around the world. Most of these titles are national award winners and are available in eBook, audio book, braille, and large print formats. All titles are available through the St. Louis Public Library.

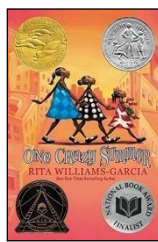
The Mighty Miss Malone

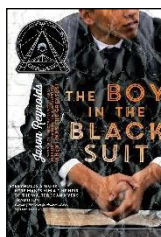


As Brave As You

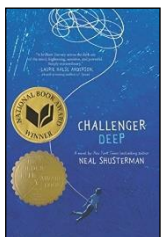


The Boy in the Black Suit

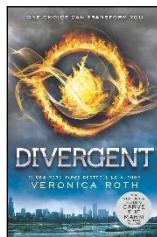


Challenger Deep

sure it holds a secret that will save the city. She and her friend Doon must race to figure out the clues before the lights go out on Ember forever!

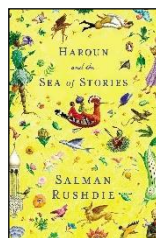


Clean Getaway

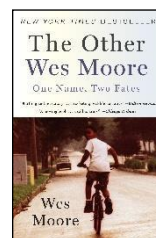


Haroun and the Sea of Stories

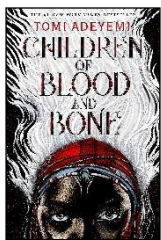
The Other Wes Moore

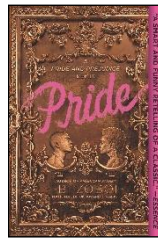
Long Way Down

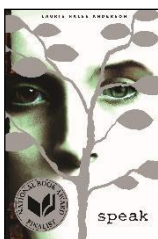
Red Queen (series)

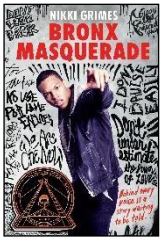

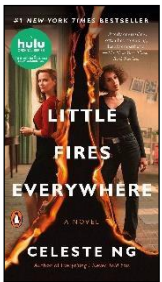


Children of Virtue and Vengeance

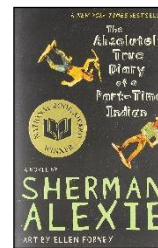


On the Come Up
