Hands in the Bible

The Greek and Hebrew words that are translated as the English word “hand” appear approximately 1,800 times in the Bible. Of these occurrences, the literal sense is intended about 500 times and the figurative sense about 1,300 times.

What did Jesus Do with His hands?

1. He blessed children with His hands. "Then people brought little children to Jesus for him to place his hands on them and pray for them. But the disciples rebuked them. Jesus said, 'Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these'" (Matthew 19:13-15, NIV).
2. All things are in His hands. "The Father loves the Son and has placed everything in his hands" (John 3:35, NIV).
3. He has created all things. "My own hand laid the foundations of the earth, and my right hand hath spread out the heavens; when I summon to them, they all stand up together" (Isaiah 48:13, NIV).
4. Jesus was a carpenter. "Coming to his hometown, [Jesus] began teaching the people in their synagogue, and they were amazed. 'Where did this man get this wisdom and these miraculous powers?'" they asked. 'Isn't this the carpenter's son? Isn't his mother's name Mary? Aren't his brothers James, Joseph, Simon, and Judas?'" (Matthew 13:54-55, NIV).
5. Jesus is a healer. "When Jesus came down from the mountainside, great crowds followed him. A man with leprosy knelt before him and said, 'Lord, if you are willing, you can make me clean.' Jesus reached out His hand and touched the man. 'I am willing,' he said. 'Be clean!' Immediately he was cleansed of his leprosy" (Matthew 8:1-3, NIV).
6. Jesus performed miracles with His hands. "When Jesus came into Peter's house, he saw Peter's mother-in-law lying in bed with a fever. He touched her hand and the fever left her. And she got up and began to wait on him" (Matthew 8:14-15, NIV).
7. Jesus was a servant. "Now that I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you should wash one another's feet. I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you" (John 13:14-15, NIV).
8. Jesus was the final sacrifice for our sins, but He arose from the grave. "A week later [Jesus'] disciples were in the house again, and Thomas was with them. Though the doors were locked, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you!' then he said to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it into my side. Stop doubting and believe'" (John 20:26-27, NIV).
