

Experimental Animation

CEAN 150 00

Mondays, June 8-July 27 6-9pm

Cost: \$250

Experimental animation refers to methods of visual storytelling alternative to trends. In this course, students will learn about the stop motion animation pipeline and apply animation techniques to non-traditional media, such as cut-out/collage, evolving charcoal drawings, and animated puppets. In addition to supplies, students will need access to a camera (phone or digital), a flexible tripod or cell phone holder, and a computer with Adobe AfterEffects software.

The Social Life of Art in Madagascar

CEFD 260 00

Mondays, June 8-July 27

6-9pm Cost: \$225

This lecture-style course explores the incredibly diverse artistic practices of Madagascar, and how they are informed by diverse ethnic groups and the critical division between rural and urban. We'll discover a wide range of Malagasy arts, giving particular attention to the relations they maintain to the island's social and cultural lives. We will consider tomb sculpture and architecture, textiles and reed weaving, wood carving, dress, hairstyles, folklore and myth, painting, face adornment and more.

2D + 3D Asset Development for Animation

CEAN 200 00

Tuesdays, June 9-July 28

6–9pm Cost: \$250

This course will cover a beginner — Intermediate level approach to asset development. This includes 3D modeling props, characters, environments, and we will discuss shape language. Students will be using industry standard applications such as Autodesk Maya and Pixologics Zbrush for 3D modeling and Adobe Photoshop for 2D projects. The overall goal of this course is for students to learn a consistent workflow for each project they choose to encounter, develop high quality portfolio pieces, and gain a new understanding of industry expectations. (Procreate, Medibang or a similar app will suffice for Photoshop. Students will need access to a compatible computer to download, install and run the free trial versions of required applications, as well as a 3-button computer mouse.)

About Face: Portraits

6-9pm Cost: \$250

This course is an exploration in the history and art of portraiture. Learn to open your eye and steady your hand! In this course focus on rendering skills, while also exploring creative ways to interpret personality and expression. From realistic to more abstracted methods of representation, this drawing course is great for both practice and trying new things. The choice of model is yours (self portraits, reference photos, family members) and we will learn to chose good reference photos and conceptualize the utilization of the grid method as a tool. All levels from beginners to portraitists are welcome! This adult class also welcomes students in grades 10-12.

Atelier Drawing

Learn classical drawing techniques in the French Academic method. For nearly 200 years, the French Academy produced some of the world's greatest draftsmen and painters. Learning to study light on form by drawing from plaster casts, still lives, and copying master works, students will gain a highly developed eye for value and a technical mastery of the drawing media. All levels welcome. For the online platform, the instructor will provide photos and reference materials to draw from.

Mixed Media Observational Drawing

Wednesdays, June 10-July 29

6-9pm Cost: \$250

Rejuvenate your drawing practice through medium exploration. We will approach observational drawing through a range of mediums including charcoal, ink, pastels, crayons, and paint. In this class you will be encouraged to break old patterns, take risks, and make new discoveries. As the class progresses, students will discover their favorite mediums to work with and create ambitious works of their own. Students will be shown historical and contemporary examples of mixed-media art and receive demonstrations on how to craft their own art materials. A recommended supply list will be given but students are welcome to save on purchasing costs by utilizing art materials from home.

Visual Culture of the Americas

Wednesdays, June 17-August 5 6-9pm

Cost: \$225

Learn about the visual and material culture of Indigenous Peoples of the New World in this lecture-style archaeology course. We will look at and analyze how different cultures illustrated their world through objects, writing, and other forms of art work. Each week will focus on a different culture, including the Maya, Aztec, Moche, and Inca. We will also think about how the legacy of these cultures endures today in current contexts, and will use resources from the Cleveland Museum of Art to learn about these objects. This adult class is also open to students in grades 9–12.

Abstract + Experimental Drawing

CEDR 315 00

Thursdays, June 11-July 30

6-9pm Cost: \$225

Get inspired and draw like you've always wanted. This class will encourage you to see the world and your work with new eyes. Students will work with a variety of drawing tools such as pencils, conte crayons, markers, felt tip pens, pastels, and willow charcoal to learn key techniques and concepts that will develop your appreciation and skills in non-representational drawing. The course will pull inspiration from an eclectic array of sources, including modern artists (Klee, Miro, and Kandinsky), YouTube videos, and avant garde film.

Sketchbook in Quarantine

Tuesdays + Thursdays, June 9–July 2 6–9pm

Cost: \$250

Artists have always kept visual diaries of their ideas and surroundings. In this online class, students will explore what that can mean during this challenging time of Covid-19. Using basic art supplies and items at hand, students will learn techniques for exploring and recording their environment in a sketchbook. The class will cover concepts such as mark making, pattern generating, and meditative drawing techniques for making art during this stressful time. Prompts will be given using short videos, and we will meet through online video sessions to discuss concepts and share our work. This course is also open to teens with parent permission.

Indigo + Fabric Design

CEFM 220 00

Thursdays, June 11-July 30

6-9pm Cost: \$250

Explore the physical transformation of cloth through pre-reduced indigo dye coloration, shibori techniques, and embellishment on a planer surface or 3D object. Historic and contemporary examples of patterned fabrics will become a reference tool, contributing a point of connection within the realm of traditional and contemporary textiles. Students will learn the vocabulary and knowledge of patterning through dyeing, resist methods such as itajime and shape resist, and embellishment by stitching and beading the surface.

Intro to Digital Photography: Get Off Auto

Thursdays, June 11-July 30

6–9pm Cost: \$250

Break away from relying on your camera's automatic settings and begin to manually control each variable that makes a photograph "work" including the ISO, the shutter speed, and the aperture. Along with learning how to manually control your camera, you will learn techniques on how to organize and edit your photos. This course will consist of online presentations on how to control your camera manually, along with virtual individual meetings, and dedicated time to practice shooting with instructor guidance. Students will need a digital camera and access to Adobe Photoshop.

Pleated Pattern Origami

CESC 220 00

Friday, June 5–June 5 9am–12pm, 1–4pm

Cost: \$75

Learn the technique of folding single sheets of paper into eye-catching pleated paper sculptures. Known as the "corrugation method", this somewhat esoteric style of origami differs in that it follows a system as opposed to step-bystep diagram instructions. Once learned, this technique can be applied to endless variations of seemingly impossible patterns that derive their beauty from the interplay of light and shadow. This improvisational method could be likened to the "jazz" of origami. We will also look at ways the folded forms can be taken further into other realms including but not limited to photography, architecture, science, and technology.

Cartooning 101

YAIL 100 00

Grades 5-8

Monday-Friday, June 8-June 19 9:30am-12:30pm

Cost: \$180

Cartooning 101 is a studio course for young, aspiring cartoonists, designed to introduce and develop a diverse set of skills around this eclectic medium. In this new online format, we will begin with a few individual projects and introduce a variety of concepts, such as narrative visual storytelling, character design, world building, story circles AKA the Hero's Journey, basic cartoon anatomy, layout/ composition and perspective. While the class is primarily a studio course, lectures will introduce students to the nature and history of cartooning - with a specific focus on Cleveland's influential cartooning and comics professionals. In addition to demonstrations and discussions, students will work remotely on projects to develop their own characters and stories, receiving individual feedback along the way. Projects include character mash-ups, designing a book cover or movie poster, an original comic and more.

Digital Illustration

YAIL 300 00

Grades 9-12

Monday-Friday, June 8-June 19

9:30am-12:30pm Cost: \$290

This course focuses on the fundamentals of digital art by teaching the basics of working in a digital environment. Students will learn to navigate Photoshop as a drawing tool, learn how to create brushes and tools to help speed up their workflow and also create several digital projects to practice their skillset. Students must have access to Adobe Photoshop and a tablet-style digital drawing tool such as a Wacom tablet, OR an iPad and Apple Pencil with the Procreate app.

Emerging Artists

Grades 5-8

Monday-Friday, June 8-June 19

9:30am-12:30pm Cost: \$180

A fun overview course designed to allow each student to explore a variety of media, techniques and methods. Projects focus on introducing and developing the elements of art (line, form, color, value, texture) and principles of design (balance, variety, harmony). We will examine some of the masters in painting as well as architecture. Projects will include engraving, Picasso-style self portraits, and Frank Lloyd Wright's prairie-style windows. Students will learn about the importance of creating an artist statement for their work. Understanding and appreciation of self and others through art, history, culture and heritage is emphasized. Students will have the opportunity to make personal choices about the creation of their art.

Intermediate Painting

Monday-Friday, June 8-June 19

Cost: \$180

You know blue and yellow makes green... but then what? Learn to communicate through your paintings in this next level painting class for middle schoolers who are familiar with painting basics. In this course, students will develop a body of five to seven paintings each based on a painting challenge to convey a specific message or theme. We'll learn to send a visual message with our art, not just through the content of our work, but through use of color and brushstroke. Across all projects, students will develop their own personal style or themes of interest, to make their work stand out from the crowd.

This course will guide you through the basics of observational drawing to create high quality and finished pieces that you can add to your art portfolio. You'll utilize different drawing materials and processes, from portraits, to still life, to landscape/nature/botanical drawing. We will also practice critiquing your work in a constructive, fun and informative way. The goal of this course is to help you reach a higher level of skill in the creation of your own artwork.

Advanced Cartooning

YAIL 400 00

Grades 9-12

Monday-Friday, June 8-June 19

1–4pm Cost: \$290

Do you know a kid or teen who loves comics and cartoons? In this online course, we'll explore the more technical side of cartooning, both visually and conceptually. We will examine a variety of concepts, such as narrative visual storytelling, character design, world building, story circles AKA the Hero's Journey, basic anatomy, layout/ composition and perspective, as well as the history of cartooning and comics, with emphasis on Cleveland's important role in the legacy. Following along with demonstrations and discussions, students will learn professional standards and practices. Working remotely, students will create their own original comic and receive individual feedback throughout the process. This advanced cartooning class is meant for any kids who take comics and cartoons seriously.

Fundamentals of Painting

YAPT 300 00

Grades 9-12

Monday-Friday, June 8-June 19

1–4pm Cost: \$290

The goal of this course is to guide emerging artists in their creative practice and establish comfort with painting as a medium. Students will create works fit for a college portfolio demonstrating capability and creative agency. We will cover fundamental painting techniques including drawing, color-mixing, and paint application. Projects will include painting from life as well as imagined concepts and constructions. Students will be exposed to historical and contemporary examples of painting and receive demonstrations on how to prepare your own painting surfaces and even make your own paint.

Interactive Internet Art

YADA 200 00

Grades 9-12

Monday-Friday, June 8-June 19

1–4pm Cost: \$290

Learn to create interactive art with digital tools and the internet. We will cover HTML and CSS, constructing static webpages, importing style libraries to control how a webpage looks and behaves, as well as introductory lessons with JavaScript to incorporate basic interactivity. Based on class progress, we will also experiment with 3D graphic libraries and play with procedural programming and anticipating how a user would interact with a webpage. No prior programming experience is required, we will start from the very beginning! While we will be writing code, our primary goal is to produce visual images with the code that we write. Students must have access to a computer (laptop or desktop) that has a microphone and video camera in order to participate in this course. We will use a dedicated text editing software (Brackets, Sublime, or Atom) which are all available for free online. Instructions on how to install these programs will be made available closer to the start of the course.

Intro to Painting

Monday-Friday, June 8-June 19

1–4pm Cost: \$180

This is a great class for any student who is interested in delving into the world of painting. Students will learn the fundamentals of creating a painting including composition, color, and paint application. As a class we will learn how to prep a canvas, sketch ideas, mix colors, and explore multiple painting tools and techniques. Paintings will be representational so each student will choose their own subject matter ranging from landscapes, still lives, human and animal portraits.

Narrative Self Portraits

Monday-Friday, June 8-June 19

1–4pm Cost: \$290

This class will explore the self and how we communicate who we are visually. Looking at portraits and self-portraits throughout history, we will learn about images as tools for communicating: from wealth and power to emotion and identity. By exploring our personal histories and using setting as a narrative tool, we'll create highly individualized self-portraits using a variety of drawing tools. This class will emphasize drawing realistic portraits by mastering facial expressions and the tricky skill of drawing likeness. This is a great course for students developing pieces for their portfolio.

Learn how to make your own short stop motion animation from home using mixed media and the free Stop Motion Studio app on your smartphone, tablet or computer. We will share our storyboards and ideas with the class to get creative feedback. The last class will be an online animation festival where we will view everyone's unique animations.
