WHAT:

Media briefing to release and discuss NCBCP's and BWR's exit poll data of Black women voters during the 2018 Midterm Elections. The coalition will share findings and the issues/policy priorities of Black women voters for the 116th Congress and in key states based on poll data.

WHY:

According to numerous polls, African American voters, particularly Black women, propelled the "Blue Wave" associated with the shift in political power in the U.S. House of Representatives and in several state and local elections during the 2018 Mid-Term Elections. **The media briefing and Black women's leadership discussion** will provide a deeper analysis of not only the impact the Black women's vote had in the results of the 2018 Election, but presenters **will also share the leadership role Black women played in shifting political power.** The NCBCP and BWR will also release the results of the 2018 Election Day Exit Poll that indicated what Black women voters identified as their priorities for the 116th Congress and in key states. Also will share any voter suppression issues voters experienced on Election Day.
