Governor's Budget

DDOE will know the Governor's budget at the end of January 2023, this will help the Early Childhood Support team make informed choices on how to spend that money directly supporting our workforce. This will be the main topic of the February 16, 2023 provider call.

Developmental Screenings

The Delaware Department of Education requested an amendment to <u>HB202</u> on Developmental Screenings to reflect requirements federal requirements around parental consent. This will allow us to finalize developmental screening regulations to go along with the Office of Child Care Licensing (OCCL) regulations. We anticipate that it will be available for public comment in the spring of 2023. Regulation revisions are anticipated to be final by July 2023, which is the implementation requirement for <u>HB202</u>.

OCCL/Delaware Department of Education (DDOE) will continue monitoring and looking for compliance around <u>HB202</u>/developmental screenings. However, OCCL/DDOE will not be citing non-compliance until one year after implementation of finalized developmental screening regulations.

Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Act Implementation (HB222)

The Office of Child Care Licensing (OCCL) appreciates your desire to be proactive regarding the recent changes to Delaware Code made by the Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Act. The Act increased the amount of lead poisoning screenings required for children from one screening at around 12 months to two screenings to be ordered at around 12 months and 24 months. To meet these new requirements, OCCL's DELACARE Regulations for Early Care and Education and School-Age Centers, Regulation 41 was changed to increase the number of blood lead screenings required within a Child's Health Appraisal form.

This regulation change was previously explained at the trainings OCCL presented on the new regulations and in the email sent to all providers on June 3, 2022.

OCCL/DDOE created regulations around child blood lead testing based on the legislation that was passed for implementation. However, implementation guidance from OCCL/DOE has not been finalized because Delaware Public Health (DPH) is still finalizing their regulations to be submitted for public comment in the Register of Regulations.

Current child care regulations (Center: #41A; Family/Large Family: #23A) require "proof of a blood lead screening for children at or around age 12 months." OCCL/DOE continues to review children's files to ensure the 12 month lead screening has been completed.

Starting in January 2023, OCCL/DDOE will <u>not</u> cite as non-compliant if a second blood lead screening at or around 24 months has not been performed. When DPH regulations are finalized, OCCL will amend child care regulations to reflect the requirement in this area. Providers will be informed and guidance provided in advance of any non-compliant citation with this second blood lead test.

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Until DPH regulations are finalized and OCCL has amended its regulations and given adequate notice for monitoring, OCCL will only monitor that Child Health Appraisals contain proof of one blood lead test for each child ages 12 months and older. Please Do NOT disenroll children who may be lacking two lead screenings.

As a result of your feedback, OCCL is seeking additional guidance from DPH to ensure clarity for everyone involved. OCCL will provide you with additional guidance as soon as possible. We appreciate your understanding as we all work to help support the health and safety of children.

Health and Safety Training

All staff, substitutes, and volunteers working at least 5 days or 40 hours per year to complete OCCL's approved Health and Safety Training for Child Care Professionals as part of the orientation to comply with the Child Care and Development Block Grant, rather than permitting the early childhood administrator to create their own version of that required training.

Other OCCL Regulations

For currently licensed family and large family child care homes the following regulations take effect **February 01**, **2023** (All family child care programs were emailed in early June with the changes):

- Adult volunteers who are present for at least five days or 40 hours per year must complete OCCL's approved Health & Safety Training for Childcare Professionals (certificate required) (13 I)
- A written release of children procedure must be added to the parent handbook that includes monitoring the entrance of the home or phone, email, or other communication methods used by the home to ensure the child is released from care when requested by the parent, guardian, or authorized release person (20 B)

The Child Care Bonus Program www.delawareece.com

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DDOE is planning on offering a 2nd round of child care bonus program that will be tied to the professional registry. If you already received the 1st round bonus and created a profile, you will need to login and fill out a few more fields. If you did not receive the 1st round of the bonus, you'll still be eligible.

More information regarding the 2^{nd} round of the child care bonus will be available in early 2023 with anticipation of the application being open around March 2023.

If you did receive a bonus payment this year, since it was taxable income, you will need to login to the portal www.delawareece.com for your 1099. You should also be receiving an email as well regarding this, so be on the lookout for that. The 1099 will come from the WELS Foundation, LLC.

Thomas Hall, Director, Delaware Department of Health and Social Services (DHSS)

The Purchase of Care (POC) Program continues to waive the family co-pay and we will be doing that through at least April 2023.

Child care providers can bill for up to fifteen (15) absent days in the month for any child that attends at least one (1) day during the month. Absent days can be the result of the following:

- Need for the child to be out
- The providers need to close the classroom(s)
- Their facility to meet quarantine and isolation requirements

The 15 absent days will be in effect through June at this time.

Providers will be given at least two-month notice should the copays no longer be waived. This is actually part of the legislation discussion right now of what the long term will be.

DHSS is leading a work group with partners from DDOE, early education professionals, other advocates for the determination payment verification of special needs children in the POC program. Hoping to have proposed regulations by February 2023.
