The History and the Future

ANCS—NIEA—NEW—Lots of letters that represent many people who had concern for Nazarene schools and Nazarene educators.

ANCS

The Association of Nazarene Christian Schools (ANCS) was the first grassroots response to the need to strengthen Nazarene churches with preschools, childcare facilities, or schools. Denominational leadership noted these churches who sponsored schools or preschools, and in 1980, the General Assembly placed responsibility for Christian schools under the direction of Children's Ministries.

In 1982, Miriam Hall, director of Children's Ministries, proposed a denominationally sponsored organization. ANCS voluntarily disbanded in favor or a new denominational organization.

NIEA

After two years of planning, the Christian School Steering Committee adopted the concept and name of Nazarene International Education Association on April 7, 1984. In June of 1984, the NIEA executive council proposed a constitution and bylaws. In February of 1985, the General Board of the Church of the Nazarene approved the documents, paving the way for ratification by NIEA membership.

As a result of a growing desire to expand the focus of NIEA beyond the support of Christian schools, a proposal was approved at the 2009 General Assembly to expand the organization to

include educators from around the globe serving in Nazarene Christian schools, public and private schools, homeschools, preschools and early childhood learning centers, and colleges and universities.

NEW

In July of 2008, Children's Ministries International hosted a Nazarene educators' task force with representatives from public schools, Christian schools, homeschools, and international schools. They discussed needs and future goals. The task force submitted recommended goals to the NIEA Executive Council in October.

At that fall meeting, the NIEA Council approved the recommendations from the task force. This included a new name, Nazarene Educators Worldwide. In February of 2009, the NEW constitution was approved by the General Board. Election for NEW officers occurred in the spring of 2009.
