## **WE WANT TO KNOW YOUR STORY!**

As you know, we recently agreed to move forward with HolyCow! Consulting to help us plan our future. You have been selected to participate in the first step which is to conduct a congregational assessment. This assessment will provide a clear picture of who we are as a church and what directions are most important for our future. The tool we'll use is the Congregation Assessment Tool (CAT), which will provide key indicators of our congregational health along with areas of challenge and potential growth. It will help us to collect and understand the range of views that exist at insert your church name and the possibilities, willingness, capacity and energy for moving our ministry into the future.

If you have provided us with a current email address, on January 9 you will receive a unique web link to complete the assessment online. If you are not able to complete the survey online, please stop by the office for steps on how to proceed.

NOTE: If there is only one email address for all members of your household, it may be tempting to have one person take the survey on behalf of the family. However, please be sure your spouse and all young adults (high school and older) living in your home have an opportunity to complete the survey. INDIVIDUAL INPUT is key to our gaining insight into overall perceptions and experiences.

Please set aside enough time to answer all the questions. This will take about 30 minutes. All survey responses are strictly anonymous.



## **Settling In**

St. Luke's strikes me as a church eager to reboot after having its wind knocked out from the COVID pandemic and other hardships experienced over the last five-plus years. People are happy to be together again—on Sundays, serving in committees, or just to gather for fellowship. It is a special place to many people. My hope is to ride this wave of new life into 2023 and beyond.

Pastoring

My Sundays with St. Luke's have been joyful. As a congregation, we are experiencing the common cup of Communion once more, a visible reminder of our call to be the body of Christ. I am grateful for the hospitality provided by those who set out coffee and refreshments each week and for the fellowship this provides. For most of the congregation, I suspect that Sunday is the only opportunity each week to gather with those of a common faith.

I began facilitating an adult forum in December. All are welcome. We've met twice so far, gathering in the library on Sundays between the two worship services to listen, reflect upon, and discuss the morning's Gospel. And, wouldn't you know, there's a lot of wisdom around that table! As a time of teaching/education, it differs from worship and fellowship; as directed conversation—in contrast to receiving a lecture—we listen to and learn from each other, sharpening each other as iron sharpens iron. I see this methodology as our default mode, though I envision other, special forums (fora?) from time to time—a special guest, an officer's report, etc. Adult Forum is taking a break around Christmas, the New Year, and the Annual Meeting, to resume on January 22.

On the sacramental horizon are baptisms, to take place on January 8, the Feast of the Baptism of our Lord. Three children will be baptized, and a guest, the Very Reverend Becca Kello of the Diocese of Kentucky, will join us.

A special event, the St Nick Dinner, took place on Tuesday, December 6. It was a joy to see so many young families gathered around dinner, conversation, and a favorite saint. Special thanks to Ron Canter for doubling as the saint and Greysen Turner for reading Saint Nick's story. We look forward to special services on Christmas Eve (I am writing this on 12/20) and another special event, especially for the younger set, on the Epiphany, January 6, our Feast of Lights Pageant.

The parish Annual Meeting will take place between worship services on Sunday, January 15. At the Annual Meeting the congregation will elect three new vestry members and a delegation to the 2023 diocesan convention. Following the Annual Meeting, the vestry will elect new/returning officers and wardens. An annual vestry retreat is planned for Saturday, February 18 from 9am to 3pm in the church library.

Coaching

The other side of the interim Priest-in-Charge coin is leading St. Luke's through a time of transition, or more concisely, coaching. This side of the coin is currently focused on the Congregational Assessment Tool, aka CAT, a survey slated to roll out to the congregation on January 9 with the window closing on January 31. Following the taking of the survey, Holy Cow Consulting will provide congregational leaders with a report and a three-hour interpretation with a consultant via Zoom. I have scheduled this expert interpretation to coincide with the annual vestry retreat. The Transition Committee will join the vestry for the interpretation.

The Transition Committee is up and running. The members are Jennifer Trently, Dave Seltzer, Berta Garrity, and Will Shull, with me serving as Chair. This team will administer and interpret the CAT, facilitate townhall discussions during Lent, develop and publish important documents (including a Parish Profile), and, when the day comes, offer a hospitable welcome to the new rector. The team is eager to set out on this work—good mojo here.

Settling

Additionally, many of you have asked how my family and I are doing with our personal time of transition. I am appreciative of your sensitivity and flexibility here. The gist is it's not without challenges. On the one hand, I am loving the opportunity to get to know many, many more people in the body of Christ—the St. Luke's congregation, of course, but also my wonderful diocesan colleagues. But, on the other hand, we humans are designed to handle only so much change at once; and right now, with recent moves, job changes, a school change for my son, and so on, I feel like my change meter is pegged (as is Holly's and Emmett's).

Healthy boundaries help, as we all know; as does adequate sleep and exercise and eating well. I'm still establishing a routine that keeps all these factors in mind—not there yet but making progress. Typically, Saturday evening through Wednesday I spend in Jackson. The apartment is quite comfortable and less than a mile from church, allowing me the joy of walking much of the time. A typical Thursday is to drop off my son at school, attend sung Morning Prayer at Sewanee's Chapel of the Apostles (the seminary chapel), and return home to write a sermon. Thursday evenings have been consumed lately with middle school basketball games. Very entertaining. And a typical Friday is to drop off my son at school and hike with my dog Ulysses, leaving the afternoon free for chores (Saturday too). Friday evenings often include a dinner date with Holly. So, these quieter, more thoughtful days are keeping me centered. Your prayers as we continue to establish our new routine are appreciated.

In November, the vestry created the Transition Committee, of which I am the chair, to guide St. Luke's through the transition from rector to rector. This team's work is comprised of three parts: 1) to administer, interpret, and assess who St. Luke's is as a congregation, 2) to write and publish important documents relevant to the future rector search, and 3) to welcome in the new rector. Please note, this is not the team that will be conducting interviews and presenting finalist(s) to the vestry; that will be the Search Committee, to be formed in perhaps a year or so. Anyway, following are photos and brief bios of each of the committee members.



Berta Garrity

I'm Berta Garrity, a St. Luke's member for about 7 years. I'm a retired middle school teacher who keeps fairly busy with my family and a couple of volunteer organizations, as well as several creative interests. I've been an active participant with the choir and the ECW since I first came to St. Luke's, and I've served on the vestry. I joined the Transition Committee because St. Luke's is my people, my tribe, my home. Jennifer Trently


