**Isabel Jaén Portillo**, Professor of Spanish, recently published "From body to world: empathy and the transformative power of cinematic imagination" in the science/interdisciplinary journal *Frontiers in Human Neuroscience*; the article has garnered 2,669 views and downloads since publication in March 2024. She also delivered the public talk/plenary session "Empathy and the Transformative Power of Fiction" for the Transformative Humanities Lecture Series and the

International Conference of Three Societies on Literature and Science at the University of Birmingham, UK (April 2024). As part of the citywide events of Shakespeare's First Folio: 1623-2023, an initiative in partnership with PSU and other arts organizations, she delivered the talk "Shakespeare, Cervantes, and Mental Health" at PSU on May 2024.

Stéphanie Roulon, Teaching Assistant Professor of French, co-authored the textbook #OnYGo, published in January 2024. #OnYGo is an innovative, Open Education Resource e-textbook that takes a multimodal, multicultural and translanguaging approach to the instruction of beginning French. Through authentic materials and activities, #OnYGo makes the learning of French varieties and cultures accessible to all, by promoting linguistic justice and transforming learning in engaging ways that equip students as globally aware, empathetic citizens engaged with the entire francophone world. The textbook is being piloted at PSU, Florida Atlantic University, Pacific University, and Southern Connecticut University. #OnYGo won the CALICO 2024 Access to Language Education Award (ALE).
